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
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CEO's foreword

Dear Readers,

2022 will go down in the history books as a turning point. The event that changed everything was Russia's invasion of Ukraine. Since then, not only trade flows have changed massively: On a political level, a new ice age has started between the West and Russia. The EU sanctions against Russia are not the only reason for this. However, they have had consequences for the Port of Hamburg, and for all of the other European seaports in the North Range. Still, in the previous year, Russia ranked fourth among the trading partners for the Port of Hamburg. During 2022, throughput came to a virtual standstill. Despite this incisive development, container handling in the Port of Hamburg developed positively in the first two guarters. The Asian ports that were closed at times due to lockdowns caused by the corona pandemic, reopened, resulting in the ocean-going containership traffic jams outside the ports being reduced to some extent. First signs of a cooling down were, however, apparent at the beginning of the third quarter with the emerging possibility of an energy crisis, caused by the lack of Russian gas. This massively impacted production costs, industry and trade planning, and the resulting shopping mood among citizens. In this challenging environment, it was once again evident how important diverse, high-quality marketing work for the Port of Hamburg is, carried out by HHM -Port of Hamburg Marketing association on behalf of its members. In particular, our representatives' personal contacts have helped to make the growing

disruptions in the supply chain comprehensible and therefore more tangible. In addition, our team succeeded again in contributing to many events, or indeed, in organizing them. Last year, this already included showcasing at some trade fairs; on an international level, for example: 'CIIE - China International Import Expo' in Shanghai, 'transport logistic Americas' in Miami and 'Breakbulk' in Rotterdam. Just how much explanation of the Port of Hamburg is needed was demonstrated by the media reporting related to all aspects of a Chinese shipping line wanting to take a share in a Hamburg container terminal. In this case, the HHM team provided support with many interviews, background discussions, plus press releases too. We were able to carry out a lot of briefing work at the half-yearly press conference, which at long last was held as an in-person event again. The facilities were made available by our member EVOS.

Further important instruments in our marketing work is the digital content. In the course of the year, we have professionally upgraded our studio. Meanwhile, we do not only use it for the established online 'PORTtalk live' conferences. Some of our members are already using it just as successfully. Concurrently, some colleagues were developing their video recording skills. Our 'PORTtalk' comes across really well on our social-media channels. This video series facilitates taking our members into consideration, putting them across 'in a perfect light'. The experts maintain good contacts in the market regions to numerous industrial and trading companies, the transport and logistics sector, business organisations and political decision-makers. HHM provides competent support to terminal operators, shipping companies and liner agents, transport service providers, warehousing, logistics and packing companies, customs experts, initial and in-service training organisations, as well as many other companies and organisations. To this end, the association implements tailor-made communication, as well as project and marketing activities at the Hamburg headquarters and the Port of Hamburg's core markets. In so doing, all activities within the membership are neutral in terms of companies and competition.



Organisational structure

A major change took place at the executive board level. On the 1st of April, joint CEO Ingo Egloff retired. Since then, Axel Mattern has continued as the only CEO. Digital communication channels and video content are increasingly commanding more space in communications. The association has therefore decided to pay more attention to this area and to develop it. Back in 2021, HHM had decided to adjust the organisational structure accordingly. This process was completed during 2022. After Bengt van Beuningen, head of Communications and Information retired, Mathias Schulz took over this position on the 1st of September 2022.

Due to the strong development of online communication and video production, the communications department has been restructured, now consisting of Press & Print, Digital & Live and Web & Technology. In addition, Marina Basso Michael has taken on responsibility for the Representative Offices in Central and Eastern Europe and Inga Gurries has taken on responsibility for activities at the Representative Offices in Asia during the second half of the year.


Association organs

The Supervisory Board consults and constructively observes the HHM executive board.

Apart from resolutions related to the business plan and annual accounts, the supervisory board determines the main focus and principal guidelines. The supervisory board consists of representatives from different membership categories, plus a delegate from the Hamburg Chamber of Commerce, the Metropolitan region's ports and the Port of Hamburg's companies' association. The members' meeting is made up of members from different membership categories. Among other things, it is responsible for the election, dismissal and discharge of supervisory board members, setting membership fees and amendments to the Articles of Association.

Staffing

As of December 31st, 2022, HHM employed a total of 39 staff: 20 at headquarters – plus two parttime students – as well as 17 in the Representative Offices.

The restructuring of the communications department may also be seen in staff development. Having just received her Master's Degree, Birte Hirsch has started her working career as Social Media Manager. On September 1st 2022, after completing his studies, Mahdi Ahmadi started at headquarters with responsibility for Media Technology and Video Production. Moreover, the Communications team welcomed Saskia Hasskamp as an intern in May. Straight after her six-month work experience, she continued working part-time as a working student. As of the 1st of July 2023, Saskia Hasskamp is continuing in her role as a full-time member of staff.



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Report by the Chairman of the Supervisory Board

Ladies and Gentlemen, Dear members,

This is the last time that I shall be addressing you with this report. I am retiring after several busy years, and therefore handing over the chairmanship of Port of Hamburg Marketing's Supervisory Board. Advising and supervising HHM's Executive Board has proven a responsible task, but also an agreeable one. Allow me to share some personal impressions: Competition



between European ports in the North Range has intensified in recent years. One of my key tasks was therefore invariably to promote the advantages and quality of the Port of Hamburg as a logistics hub. The workers in the Port all do a tremendous job. That has needed and still needs to be emphasized again and again. Whether in Hamburg or in HHM's representative offices, its staff successfully do so. I would like to thank all of them for that.

Once again, I wish to express my thanks to all HHM members. It is a great honour to have been entrusted with the leadership of HHM's Supervisory Board for so many years. Nevertheless, I could not have done it without my colleagues on the Board. This year, I would like to report to you once again on our work.

Challenging times

The past year was not only marked by the corona pandemic, persisting at the start of the year, but also by Russia's Russia's aggressive war against Ukraine. These two events and their repercussions determined the association's work.

Despite these negative factors, Port of Hamburg Marketing repeatedly succeeded in promoting the Port of Hamburg's advantages as a location.

The end of the pandemic and the related relaxations enabled HHM staff to finally plan and hold in-person events again. This also presented HHM with the challenge of managing both the newly introduced digital formats and in-person events with its available staff.

Four successful meetings

In 2022 the Supervisory Board held four regular meetings. Only the first of these, in February, was still an online event. The others were all held in person. In addition, a Representatives' Meeting was held. Rainer Fabian, in his capacity as Chairman of the Supervisory Board, provides the details. The Executive Board regularly reported on the association's financial and HR situation at the Supervisory Board meetings. The focus was on internal restructuring, with both Ingo Egloff and Bengt van Beuningen retiring during the year. In addition, the Executive Board and senior management provided the members of the Supervisory Board with extensive information on the activities of the individual departments at headquarters and the representative offices.

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At last, the focus was once again on in-person events, but also on the various online formats. Dr Rolf Strittmatter regularly participated in the meetings as a permanent guest.

The first meeting of the year, held on 8 February, was already notable for some staff changes. Jens Meier officially stepped down as a Supervisory Board member, and here I would like to take this opportunity to thank him for his work. At the same time, we welcomed Friedrich Stuhrmann, his successor, who attended the meeting as a guest. For Joint CEO Ingo Egloff, this meeting was his last. The Supervisory Board decided to admit him to the Advisory Council w.e.f. 1 April 2023.

At our second meeting, we were the guests of MSC. The Annual Report for 2021 was approved at this meeting on 10 May. Further decisions were the appointment of Mathias Schulz to HHM's Management Board, and the approval of the internal reorganisation of the association structures. This placed Axel Mattern, Kerstin Pfietzmann and Mathias Schulz at the head of the association, with Marina Basso Michael, Stefan Breitenbach, Ralf Johanning and Jochen Wischhusen as heads of department. Decisions were also taken on adjustments in the press area, and the reorganisation of activities in Asia.

On 13 September 2022, the members of the Supervisory Board met at GHB for their third meeting of the year. The meeting focused on the financial statement for 2021, which was approved along with a statement on the implementation of port communication measures. The Supervisory Board also discharged the Chairman and selected Grant Thornton to audit the Annual Financial Statement, We also elected Friedrich Stuhrmann as Deputy Chairman of the Supervisory Board.

In the last guarter of the year 2022, the Supervisory Board met at HHLA on 22 November. It passed the Economic Plan for 2023 and approved the acquisition of a new CRM system. The Supervisory Board also decided to accept the special contribution of the Hamburg Port Authority.

We are also pleased to welcome Hapag Lloyd as a 'C' member. Volker Werner succeeds me on the

Supervisory Board, which elected Hans-Jörg Heims as the new Chairman of the Supervisory Board, who took office on 1 January 2023.

In many areas, we may have been able to leave the corona pandemic behind us. However, new challenges have arisen in its place. Despite all the unpredictability, as an association we have mastered 2022 in an excellent manner. On behalf of the entire Supervisory Board, I should like to thank all the members of Port of Hamburg Marketing for the trust they have placed in us in these challenging times. I must now take my leave. It has been a wonderful time.

Port Highlights



Clearance for second stage of adjustment of navigation channel

Modification of the navigation channel of the Lower and Outer Elbe was completed at the end of January 2022. Depending on vessel dimensions, incoming and departing shipping profited from a draft increase of between 1.00 and 1.90 metres in comparison to the situation before adjustment of the navigation channel. Partial widening of the channel is of at least equal importance. With a length of eight kilometres, a passing box with a width of 385 metres has been constructed between Wedel and Blankenese. Downstream, the channel has been widened from 300 to 320 metres between Wedel and the mouth of the River Stör.

In practice, it showed that it was especially this section that simplified their work for all those involved.



Hamburg as test city for autonomous trucks

Hamburg was selected as the first test city In Germany for autonomous trucks in October. As part of the MODIP project, the next four years will see trials of test runs by autonomous trucks between the autobahn and the Port of Hamburg. The prime aim of the project is to appropriately counter the current shortage of drivers and scarce transport capacities in Europe.

World's largest containership in Hamburg

The 'Ever Alot' called Hamburg in September 2022. With a length of 400 metres and width of 61.5 metres, the vessel has space for 24,004 TEU. This makes her the world's largest containership just now, but also the first Megamax vessel to crack the magic figure of 24,000 TEU. She sails between Northern Europe and Asia for Evergreen, the Taiwanese shipping company.



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Successful first test delivery of ammonia

October saw the first low-emission delivery of hydrogen in the form of ammonia, which had been transported from the United Arab Emirates to copper smelter Aurubis. HHLA transhipped the pilot consignment at its Container Terminal Altenwerder. Completion marked an important milestone for the import in the medium term of green hydrogen for Germany and Europe.





Hamburg to have import terminal for green hydrogen

Germany's first large import terminal for green energy is to be bult in the Port of Hamburg, as announced by Air Products and Mabanaft in November. The construction project now agreed seeks to supply Germany with hydrogen from 2026. Its location at Mabanaft's tank farm facilitates strategic access to the green ammonia produced in the plants operated worldwide by Air Products. This is to be transformed into green hydrogen in Hamburg before being distributed from there.

Using the App to become a port expert

Port of Hamburg Marketing released the new Port of Hamburg App in December. This provides extensive port data for everybody from logistics experts to the port fan interested in the port as tourist. One highlight is the function 'Hafen live.' This uses augmented reality to show which vessels, terminals and companies are located in the vicinity of the user.

A 'Port plan' and data on 'Liner services' can also be downloaded from the app, which is obtainable from the Google Play and Apple stores.

Transport policy lobbying

lacing port industry topics at federal political level is of great importance, especially after federal lower house - Bundestag - elections. At all levels of federal politics, the people to be approached have often changed. In their new function, they are automatically confronted with many maritime questions and need to familiarize themselves with those topics. Port of Hamburg Marketing (HHM) actively provides support in the form of personal discussions and many event formats. At the beginning of the year, Axel Mattern and Ingo Egloff held numerous appointments with members of parliament to get to know them and to place port policy topics.

Highly popular Port Breakfast in Berlin

One of the most popular events as part of lobbying activity is the Port Breakfast. The Hamburg Chamber of Commerce and HHM devised this format back in 2010. Its aim was, and remains, to inform members of parliament and representatives of ministries about the maritime logistics chain. In 2015, the Port Breakfast found a new home with the Maritime Forum in the Capital, or the Maritimes Hauptstadtforum. This also expanded the range of organizers. Along with HHM, these are the German Industries Federation, the Federation of Public Inland Ports, the Chamber of Commerce & Industry - North, the German Shipowners Association, VSM - the Shipbuilding and Maritime Technology Federation, the German Shipbrokers Association, and the Federation of German Seaports. They take it in turns to host the event. In the period under review, the first two breakfasts had to be organized in a digital event.

As in the previous year, the breakfasts received a great deal of support on the topics of the adjustment of the Elbe navigation channel and the protection of the Kiel Canal. In May, participants were at last able to gather again at Hamburg's Berlin representative office and discuss the plan for the port's future. Three Port Breakfasts followed on the topics 'German Deepsea Shipping: Transition in a sector for the future,' "Seaports to a German Schedule' and 'An era of change for the maritime industry.'

The Blue Hour

To familiarize both politicians and government officials more closely with maritime topics, four Hamburg-based organizations and associations have joined forces and developed a new format: the Blue Hour.

Hamburg Cruise Net, the Elbe Pilots Fraternity, the Hamburg & Bremen Shipbrokers' Association and HHM issued invitations to the first session on April 6, 2022. The aim is to hold discussions aside from everyday routine. The new format kicked off with data on maritime transport chains from the standpoint of the various players. Participants enjoyed a get-together afterwards. On November22, the second Blue Hour then addressed the question 'The economy without waterways - can that function?' Both events were very well received in Berlin.

Press & Print

Port Evenings each attract more than 100 guests

HHM twice issued invitations to Port Evenings at Hamburg's representative office. The first of these was novel in being organized jointly by the Bremen ports, Seaports of Lower Saxony, and HHM. Under the heading 'Germany's North Sea ports – jointly into the future', representatives of trade and industry and top representatives of the relevant ministries discussed the future positioning of Germany's North Sea ports.

In November, the HHM Representative Office for Eastern Germany held an additional Port Evening in Berlin. Around 100 guests accepted this invitation to the Hamburg Representative Office in Berlin. Among the speakers were Andreas Rieckhof, Under-Secretary in the Hamburg Ministry of Economics and Innovation, and Friedrich Stuhrmann, CCO and board member at HPA – Hamburg Port Authority.

As guests in Hamburg

To a special extent, transport policy lobbying involves looking after federal MPs and other politicians from Germany and the world when they visit Hamburg. Escorted port tours are extremely popular and informative. Among guests in the port in 2022 were Dr. Volker Wissing, Federal Minister of Transport, and his Lithuanian counterpart, Dr. Marius Skuodis. The importance of the Port of Hamburg for a well-functioning economy needs to be stressed again and again.

he importance of the Port of Hamburg for a well-functioning economy needs to be stressed again and again. To this end, the diversity of companies offers a good working basis for HHM - Port of Hamburg Marketing's press team. At the same time, last year we came to recognize a great sense of uncertainty in the media. This was most evident in the case of a shipping line possibly acquiring a share at Container Terminal Tollerort belonging to HHLA - Hamburger Hafen und Logistik AG. In this case above all, we provided sup-

port, answering questions from the national and international press and publishing press releases. However, this was not the only major topic keeping us busy in 2022. The consequences of the Ukraine war and the resulting sanctions against Russia occupied

us just as much. Here too, we tried to provide as much information to the media. This applied equally to disruptions in the global supply chains and ship traffic jams in front of the ports worldwide. In total, the HHM press team issued 37 press releases during

last year. These included releases for members, such as Eichholtz' ninetieth anniversary. Many of our own press releases were issued bilingually. To this end, our team continually updates our own press distribution list, expanding it to ensure that we are present in the media worldwide.

At the beginning of the year, for the release of the annual and first-quarter figures HHM continued to rely on online presentations of handling figures from its own studio. This format had proven its worth during the previous corona pandemic years. During the presentation of the annual figures the accredited journalists were able to place their questions in the chat function. Despite the successful format, it was a highlight for us to hold our half-yearly press conference in person again. Our member EVOS provided us with the necessary facilities. This event was a complete success for HHM, merging seamlessly with the time before the Corona-Pandemic.

Additionally, four times during the year, our team again switched into the role of editor, reporting in our in-house Port of Hamburg Magazine regarding trends and current news from the universal

Port of Hamburg. Each high-quality edition focuses on a specific topic, e.g. Port Working World, Container Port Hamburg, Port and Climate and Digitalization, during 2022. This provides HHM members the opportunity to present their particular services. The Magazines are also available in various online versions. The press team drafted and designed the HHM Annual Report. For a long time now, HHM has no longer been exclusively concerned with print products. The press department was concurrently always involved in making its own and members' news available in the Internet portal www.hafen-hamburg.de. Over and above this, the staff helped with the storyboards for PORTtalk and supported subsequent reporting on the PORTtalk live events.



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Digital & Live

he Digital & Live team in the Communications Department handles online content, social media and video production, along with trade fairs and events. In 2022 we were able to enjoy an unprecedented, colourful mixture of online events plus real on-the-spot happenings. Some methods and ideas created and ripened during the pandemic survived, while others returned after a two-year break! We created and uploaded exciting content, being active both on-line and offline as promoters, co-promoters, speakers and organizers. In addition, we ended the year with a total of around 55,000 followers on social-media channels.

Networking and interchange – at long last both online AND offline

At the beginning of the year, the pandemic still had social life firmly in its grip. Until spring, it was still impossible to hold trade fairs and events on the customary scale or in the usual form. HHM -Port of Hamburg Marketing worked continuously on appropriate changes to communication methods and developing new ones. Digitally, by hybrid means or in person, we succeeded in maintaining a lively presence, including trade fair participations, round-table contributions, or our own and external events.

In the course of 2022, in-person events once again became part of everyday marketing. Wherever possible, personal encounters were the aim. Wherever we did not wish to forfeit coverage achieved during the pandemic, hybrid settings were created – for the half-annual press conference in August, for instance.

One highlight after the long winter of the pandemic was the first in-person trade fair presence at Breakbulk Europe in Rotterdam. HHM participated in the form of a joint venture stand showcasing a total of nine co-exhibitors. Events and in-person sessions for Port of Hamburg Representative Offices continued to receive head office support. Towards the end of the year, in November, a leap across the big pond to 'transport logistic America' in Miami proved feasible. A joint venture stand

under the umbrella 'German Ports' was mounted together with the ports of Bremen and Lower Saxony. Also in November, the focus in organizing events was on continuation of the Future Conference for industry, logistics and ports on the topic of 'Northern Germany as an Al base.' This event was now in its third round, and for the first time as a hybrid conference. After a move shortly beforehand, the recently opened Digital Hub Logistics served as the location. An exciting keynote discussion panel

plus two others enabled experts and scientists along with people currently working in various areas of the port, transport and energy sector to discuss 'Logistics innovations and secure energy supply with the aid of digitalization and artificial intelligence.' Like the second, the third Future Conference can also be downloaded from our website as a recording.

We were once again able to let the year expire in a relaxed atmosphere, with our second Maritime

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Christmas Market. This is an event staged jointly by HHM, LIHH – Logistics Initiative Hamburg, VHBS -Hamburg/Bremen Shipbrokers' Association, HCN - Hamburg Cruise Net and the cooperation partner Cruise Gate Hamburg. The event series was launched in 2021 to provide an opportunity for networking despite the winter of the pandemic.

On Land, Water and in the Air – we continue to film!

In the area of video production HHM made continued progress in 2022, not solely at a technical level, but also in respect of content emphasis in the different video types. This year Mathias Schulz and Birte Hirsch featured as moderators for around ten clips in the PORTtalk series. Right from the ideas stage, the team is engaged in planning, filming, cutting and publicity to bring exciting port topics in an attractive way to viewers everywhere. To the fore here is our network of members, partners in the port, and political figures. This year we captured TCO Transcargo, Packing Center Hamburg, Eichholtz, and the Port Captain himself, on film. We also produced an explanatory video of the innovative project BOSS - Border One Stop Shops. At the same time, we further developed the concept behind the PORTtalk series established in 2020. Now and in future, the idea is for focus to be more on the range of logistics and port company topics. The storyline meanwhile consists less of the traditional interview than the

actual sequence of a working, creation or handling process at the shooting location. New camera and drone equipment and new storytelling mean that the series is continuously improving, while remaining entertaining and informative, even after numerous sequences.

Since we produce PORTmovies to mark special events, our followers can also experience events and visual highlights from the port anytime via our channels. Here, everything revolves around spectacular views showing the port from its most beautiful and impressive side. The arrival of the containership 'Ever Alot' and the Port Anniversary held again in September were visual highlights. Short video summaries are available of our online and hybrid events, for example the half-yearly press conference, or the Future Conference. An extended clip of the livestream can also be found on the events page of our website.

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On Air – Networking at lunchtime on PORTtalk live

The 'PORTtalk live' series continues to be produced in cooperation with Representative Offices. With a few exceptions, once a month this has featured briefing and discussion of various topics and the latest developments in the Port of Hamburg. For eight editions of this event series for the mid-day lunch break, we welcomed fascinating discussion partners to our virtual studio. Moderator Mathias Schulz led discussions on the topics of digitalization, LCL and RoRo. The English edition of 'PORTtalk live' was moderated by Maciej Brzozowski, head of HHM's Warsaw Representative Office. Another highlight was the first issue of PORTtalklive in January 2022. As an exception, the association itself was to the fore. Under the motto 'Inside HHM', we were able to introduce live the different departments and their staffers in short video clips for PORTtalk live. This provided a glimpse behind the scenes of our everyday activities and our technical equipment. Altogether, we were happy to welcome around 1,350 viewers for our live PORTtalk issues during 2022.

Hamburg, Your Port - on LinkedIn, Instagram, Twitter, Facebook, YouTube, and in the App

We are still growing! More than 21,000 followers watched our LinkedIn focus page on the Port of Hamburg at the end of the year, while Facebook attracted around 20,000 port fans and Twitter and Instagram each counted almost 5,000 followers. With their own LinkedIn channels, our colleagues in the Representative Offices were also able to generate fresh coverage in the relevant market regions of Europe.

After the sub-page of the Vienna Representative Office had already successfully gained over 1,500 followers, the LinkedIn pages of the Budapest, Warsaw and Prague Representative Offices were also delighted by rising follower numbers. The content on the Port of Hamburg LinkedIn page was viewed 1.8 million times, i.e. it scored that many clicks. On Facebook our score was 2.1 million clicks.

We were able to use the various social media networks to reach our different target groups with relevant topics, to communicate ad-hoc and live on the spot, to cultivate our network, and not least to stay informed ourselves.

Along with news of our member companies, video contributions and general impressions of the port, various briefing formats also form part of our editorial plan. Along with the recurring format 'Did you know?', an additional template can now be used repeatedly for the latest industry news. The

'rePORT' format is especially suitable for the latest local news. New Port of Hamburg liner services can be handily summarized there. With over 30,000 competitors for prizes, the an-

nual Advent calendar run in cooperation with our members proved to be a total success. This meant that we had over 30,000 takers for the second year running, and were delighted to be able to offer 21 of our member companies a special form of coverage.

Besides the Advent calendar, in December the focus of our social media activities was on the just launched Port of Hamburg app. This launch reaped nothing but positive feedback on all social media channels. The app campaign will be continued with further postings during 2023.

Comprising around 55,000 followers on social media channels, our network gives us more than sufficient reason to say 'Thank You', and the motivation to constantly expand our content.

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Web & Technology

he year's highlight for the Web & Technology team was the introduction of the new Port of Hamburg App. Moreover, online events became an established part of our association's work. The website and many services were further developed.

New App for the port

Port of Hamburg Marketing (HHM), has issued a new Port of Hamburg App, equipped with numerous functions. One of its highlights is the 'Port live' function. It shows what is to be seen in the user's vicinity. If, for example, you hold your Smartphone in the direction of a ship, the app displays the name of the vessel in augmented reality.

This function is just one of eight in the new Port of



Hamburg App. All information on the website can also be called up on the App. This includes the ship database, the cruise ship sailing list, the port map and a great deal of data such as liner services and the intermodal databank.

Reporting live from our own studio

During 2022, even more state-of-the-art technology has moved into our own studio. This supports the production of online live events such as our 'PORTtalk live' format and the online events commissioned by our members. A total of ten events were produced in the HHM studio. It was also used to record video contributions and to send greetings.

Image film 'Green, reliable and fit for the future: Inland waterway craft'

Right on time for the 'Elbe Shipping Day', an image film about inland waterway shipping was produced on commission. The film was first screened during the event's opening ceremony, performed by Hamburg's First Mayor, Dr Peter Tschentscher This first commissioned production proved to be a complete success for HHM.

After its relaunch in 2021, the team optimized the Port of Hamburg website, further fine-tuning it to customer needs. This included close cooperation with the Hamburg Vessel Coordination Center (HVCC). An interface to the HVCC now provides qualitatively and quantitatively better data on ship arrivals. During 2022, we have also succeeded in taking the important transport carrier – inland waterway craft - more into account. A variety of vessels are held in the ship database and the ship arrivals are also on the website. Apart from our own

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Market Research

n 2022 the Russian attack on Ukraine and its consequences triggered many questions to HHM - Port of Hamburg Marketing's market research department. These repeatedly revolved around the repercussions for the Port of Hamburg. Uncertainties about the economy also arose in the course of the year. While the end of the pandemic meant a step towards reality for ship traffic, high inflation, full warehouses and shipping bottlenecks caused fresh uncertainties. In 2022, HHM's market research managed to engender some calm, badly needed in the fraught situation in the media.

Last year, the tense situation worldwide also affected the Port of Hamburg. While throughput rose slightly during the first half, in the second it followed the trend for all European ports by falling. However, seaport-hinterland services via the Port of Hamburg proved extremely resilient and stable. The trend in its modal split remained satisfactory. Rail transport with over 50 percent of volume in tonnage terms outpaced other carriers. During 2022, HHM market research once again reported regularly on the current situation. Monthly reports informed members on port trends, liner services and developments in seaport-hinterland transport.

'SeegüterrePORT' - the seaborne cargo report - also invariably analyzed a specific market of interest for Hamburg, or likely to be.

HHM also provided much market-relevant data online for members, port customers and partners. For example, the databases 'Intermodal' and 'Liner Services' were continuously updated, enabling those interested to view current links - both by sea and on land – to and from Hamburg at any time. In addition, all the official statistics on the port can be found on the Port of Hamburg website.

n crisis-ridden times and, above all, with regard to the increasingly noticeable impact of climate change, the development of efficient, innovative and ecological transport solutions tops the agenda for HHM - Port of Hamburg Marketing and its members. Topics such as the generation, storage and use of alternative energies and fuels, as well as the expansion of intermodal transport solutions, and increased efficiency through automation, characterized the project landscape in 2022. During the year, our colleagues in the Project team have, once again, done a really good job in the right direction by leading, or collaborating in, EU and nationally promoted projects. Below, there is a brief overview over current, completed and upcoming projects:

CURRENT PROJECTS:

Aim: Low emission, 'smooth' ports have been important economic centres and growth motors for centuries. By integrating players from administration, port and logistics companies along the supply chain, the **Smooth Ports** project aims to reduce the CO_2 emissions of port-related road traffic through a holistic approach. HHM is acting here as communications manager, supporting the Ministry of Economics and Innovation (BWI) with its project management function. During the first phase of the project the partners have developed various regulations and solutions to reduce emissions in ports, testing them for their suitability for other port locations. The content work in the Smooth Port project, promoted by the Interreg Europe programme, was completed in 2021. A twelve-month monitoring phase followed in 2022, during which the implementation measures were checked for their success.

Smart Intermodality

The North Sea Region - NSR is a logistics zone in Europe: The major seaports are located there, and the many intermodal transport hubs, too. To enhance the attractiveness of a location, together with its market potential, efficient, green transport networks are needed: This is being researched and tested in the **NSR Connect** project under HHM project management. North Sea Region Connect is intensively dealing with the improvement and increased efficiency of freight transport on the trans- European transport network - TEN-T in the North Sea Region.

The aim of the North Sea Region Connect Project is to promote intelligent, intermodal and sustainable freight traffic growth in the North Sea Region. To this end, the most varied pilot applications were developed. Among them is one that HPA - Hamburg Port Authority – is implementing in Europe's biggest rail port. Some 200 freight trains run on the Hamburg port rail network daily. Coordinating the freight traffic is a corresponding challenge.

HPA enhanced the central Rail Port Community System with a slot-plan data structure for more intermodal seaport terminals. Each terminal can continue to use its own planning system. This will lead to further digitalization and increased efficiency in freight train transport.


Concentrated expertise for the Baltic Sea Region The project platform, BSR Access (BSR = Baltic Sea Region) promoted by the Interreg Baltic Sea programme serves to promote clean, efficient, multimodal transport corridors in the Baltic Sea Region. BSR Access pools the competences of the EMMA, TENTacle, NSB CoRe, GREAT und Scandria2Act transport projects in a cooperation platform for transport inter-operability and regional development. HHM is a project partner in the first three projects named above. The main aim of the project platform is to mobilize the interested parties for a coherent, supra-sector, more adaptable planning approach, facilitating better access to the TEN-T Core Network Corridor infrastructure, resulting in sustainable regional growth.

In March 2022 the project was successfully completed.

NEWLY STARTED PROJECTS Helping robots for geater safety in work processes

The **CoboTank** research project is covering automated solutions in the area of handling liquid cargo in German inland ports. Until now, this has been characterized as manual, physically exhausting work. The formulated project aim is the development of robotic aids (COBOTS) when loading and discharging tankers.

The CoboTank plans to develop a partly-automated Cobot and a fully-automated Robot. The implementation of a Cobot should lead to higher process and occupational safety. In turn, the Robot should facilitate automation, where practicable, for loading processes.

Strengthening the role of ports

To promote the implementation of alternative fuels in freight transport, at the same time, it is a good approach to push ahead in ports with the development of appropriate infrastructure, too. After all, the handling, storage and distribution of the alternative energy carriers and fuels take place there.

The **REDII Ports (North Sea)** investigates the resources for a technically feasible and commercially viable generation, storage and use of alternative energies and fuels in port locations.

The analyses serve the project partners involved for the development of medium and long-term strategies to equip their ports for these developments. To achieve this goal, REDII Ports is working on a three-phase roadmap, covering local sources, via production and storage in the ports and on to the market, coming full-circle by benefitting the regions.

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Blue Supply Chain Kick Off Meeting in Hamburg

Decarbonizing port locations thanks to electrification and intermodal transport

The Blue Supply Chains project is supporting port authorities and operators with the implementation of effective long-term measures for decarbonizing port locations. To achieve this, the project is following several different approaches. It is looking for the opportunity to find solutions to electrifying more handling equipment. A further point is the development of strategies for storing and handling alternative fuels. In addition, promoting more environment-friendly transport chains into the hinterland are in the project plan, with the focus centred on enhancing intermodal transport.

Those working on the project for a better integration of the Rostock-Trelleborg ferry service in intermodal transport chains are Stena Line, Rostock Port, modility, Studiengesellschaft für den Kombinierten Verkehr – 'Feasibility studies for intermodal transport' and the Port of Trelleborg. The two ports are the quay-wall for the last remaining railway ferry on the Baltic Sea. At the same time this service and the port system represent an important infrastructural redundancy for Scandinavia's rail connection to mainland Europe.

Outlook 2023

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Locations and Markets

o optimize coverage of the Port of Hamburg's core markets, Port of Hamburg Marketing (HHM) is active worldwide with its Representative Offices. In 2022, at eleven locations, Port of Hamburg Representative Offices (HHR) represented the interests of HHM member companies and the metropolitan region. In their regions, the Representatives are the initial point of contact on the spot for customers and members. They function as intermediaries, market researchers, and project managers, to put across and underline the efficiency of the Port of Hamburg. Among other activities, the HHRs cultivate relations with bodies in industry, trade, transport and logistics, as well as trade associations, political decision-makers, and leading training/educational institutions.

The representatives are also actively involved in relevant networks, alliances and associations, engaging in port and transport policy lobbying. Also part of the portfolio are regular networking and information events such as Port Evenings, Shippers' Days and industry trade fairs. Of special importance is proximity to the upcoming forwarding and logistics generation – HHR colleagues promote the industry and the Port of Hamburg at universities and trade schools with expert lectures, panel memberships and visit programs.

At the beginning of 2022, the pandemic continued to restrict the activities of Representative Offices, so that in many places, events and meetings were only feasible in digital form. Yet that did not limit their work. With the outbreak of Russia's war of aggression against Ukraine, our colleagues in St. Petersburg limited activities to no more than reporting. Over the year, however, many Representative Offices were able to return to normality. Our colleagues took advantage of that, once again inviting guests to a wide variety of events. In close cooperation with the head office, they continued to plan and hold the 'PORTtalk live' series in 2022.

The Port of Hamburg has for many years led the field in handling overseas exports and imports to and from Southern Germany. Of the port's throughput, more than one million TEU have their origin or destination there. For the strongly export-oriented economy of the region, a top-notch rail link between Germany's largest seaport and its manufacturing centres is especially advantageous. International, well-organized middle-ranking companies, the long-standing variety of industries, a marked willingness to innovate and invest, and an above-average services sector ensure flourishing trade.

The beginning of 2022 was notable for a strong recovery of the economy after corona pandemic restrictions. Yet even in Southern Germany, such international crises as the Ukraine war hampered growth. The Port of Hamburg has been present in Bavaria with its own Representative Office since 1961. Also covering Switzerland and Baden-Württemberg, since the beginning of last year, this has been located in Augsburg, with Karin Lengenfelder, head of HHM's Representative Office, Southern Germany/Switzerland, busy building up and expanding business links in the region.

HHR Western Germany

With its industry largely shaped by foreign trade, North Rhine-Westphalia is of great significance for the Port of Hamburg. Shippers and logistics providers from the region use the dense network o of worldwide liner services for the worldwide distribution of import and export freight, including trade and department store goods, metals and metal products, machines and equipment, and food and beverages. With annual throughput of 530,00 TEU, North Rhine-Westphalia ranks second among the regions for the Port of Hamburg's container hinterland. The connections by rail once again proved resilient in 2022.

HHM – Port of Hamburg Marketing has been active for many years in the most important market regions, and especially in North-Rhine-Westphalia, Lower Saxony and Hesse.

Markus Heinen as Head of HHM's Representative Office maintains close contact with key players among shippers and logistics providers. Using events with differing formats, he repeatedly stresses the Port of Hamburg's advantages. For enterprises in the region, he is the first person to approach on building up and maintaining logistic chains via the Port of Hamburg.

HHR Eastern Germany

Especially for containerized shipments, the Port of Hamburg is the top port for Central and Eastern Germany. The port is also an important gateway to markets around the world for conventional breakbulk and bulk cargo. Its connections to inland waterways play an important for the latter, since overweight and oversized shipments can be transported along them without problems. The most significant branches of industry in the region are engineering, plant and vehicle manufacture, chemicals and mining, as well as agricultural and forestry output. Leading manufacturers have invested in the region in recent years, boosting the regional economy.

The cutting-edge stance of such companies helped to keep the repercussions of the corona pandemic within manageable limits. The interests of Hamburg's seaport business have been represented in the 'new states' since 1990. Headed by Stefan Kunze, HHM's Representative Office in Dresden cultivates intensive contacts with companies in trade and industry, the transport and logistics sector, and trade associations. Close contacts are maintained too with political decision-makers in Mecklenburg-Western Pomerania, Berlin, Brandenburg, Saxony-Anhalt, Saxony and Thuringia, to provide news of developments in Hamburg as a all-purpose port and conduct political lobbying. Transport by inland waterway vessels is one of the top themes for these activities.

HHR Vienna

Excellent trade relation between Austria and Hamburg have existed for centuries. Since the 1950s the Port of Hamburg has gained in importance for the Austrian economy, and since the 1970s as a very important transhipment hub. Companies in Austria especially appreciate the Port of Hamburg's fine rail infrastructure and worldwide liner network – and Hamburg has now topped Austria's container traffic for over 40 years. In



Information event in Linz

2022, 323,000 TEU were transported between Hamburg and Austria. Among the main cargoes imported and exported were timber, paper, beverages, fittings, automotive equipment, machinery and plant elements. At 6.3 million tons, tonnage in 2022 reached a new record. Among the reasons for this was voestalpine's import business. Over the last ten years, the Port of Hamburg's transhipment total for freight from/to Austria has doubled. The country's industry uses Hamburg as an

Port Evening in Berlin

HHR – Eastern Germany invited logistics specialists and politicians interested in transport to Berlin for a Port Evening. A lecture on modernization of the Port of Hamburg by Friedrich Stuhrmann, HPA's CCO, offered the basis for a brisk exchange between those present. Discussion centred on digitalization and sustainability. Calls for an expansion of hinterland infrastructure as part of transport policy were also in order.

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Eastern Europe / Baltic Region

HHR Budapest

The Port of Hamburg's excellent infrastructure for hinterland transport and effective logistics processes make it an attractive partner for the Hungarian market. Hungary is of great importance for the distribution of freight flows within Europe. Its favourable geographical location between the countries of Central, Southern and Eastern Europe as well as the TEN-T corridors running through the country, make a decisive contribution here. Although in 2022 economic growth in Hungary was slightly lower than in the previous record year, with 4.6 percent, its annual growth rate was one of the highest since 1989. In 2022, the Port of Hamburg was able to report a notable increase in the volume of containers transported to/from Hungary to 153,179 TEU.

The Port of Hamburg is present in the Hungarian capital with a Representative Office. HHR Budapest was founded in 1992, celebrating its 30th anniversary in 2022 with a Port Evening. Krisztina Kovács as Head of the HHR regularly organizes visits and delegation tours to the Port of Hamburg. She keeps the Hungarian shipper community reliably informed of the latest developments there, also regularly making available current Hungarian market and industry data. Krisztina Kovács maintains contact with the Hungarian press and has been in discussion with the Hungarian Forwarders' Association about launching a taskforce 'Intermodal'.

HHR Prague

Hamburg and Czechia have been closely connected ever since the 14th century, and this remains true today. Hamburg has meanwhile established itself as the largest transhipment port for Czech and Slovakian foreign trade.

In 2022, almost 500,000 TEU were transported in hinterland transport with the Czech Republic and Slovakia. More than 130 direct weekly container block trains enabled more than 480,000 TEU, or almost 95 percent, of these import and exports containers to be transported by rail, protecting the environment. This makes rail the top carrier between Hamburg and the region.

Since 1990, the interests of the seaport transport business in Prague have been looked after by our HHM Representative Office. Vladimír Doboš, its head, is active here in the service of the port and 'keeps his ear to the ground', i.e., the market. He provides optimal coverage for Hamburg's Czech and Slovakian customers, keeping them informed of the latest developments in and around the all-purpose Port of Hamburg. Since the end of the corona pandemic again allows this, the Prague HHR plays an active part in various events and conventions in the region, also organizing the Port Evening and 'Hamburg Stammtisch' in Prague.

HHR Warsaw

The Port of Hamburg is an important linchpin for the distribution of Polish import and export goods. Over ten percent of all Polish container trade is handled via Hamburg. Poland is among the few countries connected to the Hanseatic port by both sea and land. This unique situation enables the Port of Hamburg to offer a superb combination of rapid and environment-friendly services by feeder ship, rail and truck.

The bulk of container traffic – or almost 300.000 TEU – is handled via the Kiel Canal between Hamburg and the container terminals in Gdansk, Gdynia and Szczecin. Rail is the second most important carrier between Hamburg and Poland. In 2022, some 30 weekly trains transported a total of 95,000 TEU.

Hamburg benefits too from rail services with the rail hub Małaszewicze in Eastern Poland. This makes it an important destination for container traffic with China. Chemical products, foodstuffs and beverages, along with machinery, furniture and electrical goods are the main exports.

The Port of Hamburg has had its own Representative Office in the Polish capital Warsaw since 1996. This serves to cultivate and expand contacts on the spot between the Hamburg port industry and customers, shippers, institutions, trade association and public bodies. With responsibility for advising and cultivating Polish companies, since 2002 Maciej Brzozowski HUNGARY

has assisted on questions relating to the Port of Hamburg. As Head of the HHR, he organizes events such as the Port Evening, presents the Port of Hamburg in the Polish media, and participates in panel discussions, all aimed at boosting awareness of the Hanseatic port.

HHR St. Petersburg

The Port of Hamburg has been present with a Representative Office in St. Petersburg since 2003. Since the beginning of Russia's aggressive war on Ukraine, however, the HHR has no longer done any active marketing.

The activities of Natalia Kapkajewa, Head of the HHR, and her colleagues Olga Starodubtseva have since been limited to monitoring the market, compiling analyses and statistics on the Russian economy, and making available data on the current state of the situation in Russia's logistics market.

Markets cultivated by Head Office

The recently formed MOE - Central & Eastern Europe department in HHM head office aims to promote closer interchange between the Representatives and combine their joint strengths. Responsibility for supervising the Representative Offices in Eastern Europe/the Baltic lies with Marina Basso Michael. As Regional Director Europe, she is responsible for markets in Scandinavia and the Baltic too. These combine traditional elements and a young dynamic economy, and are seen as

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power-houses in Europe. Marina Basso Michael cultivates regular contacts with partners in these and neighbouring countries. HHM has established itself as a powerful player in Central and Eastern Europe and will continue to focus on the transport and logistics sector, while remaining engaged in close interchange with representatives of business and politics. Tailor-made events and campaigns will stress the advantages of the Port of Hamburg and strengthen the leading position of Germany's largest seaport. HHM sees welcoming delegations from its target regions in Hamburg, and convincing them on the spot of the merits of the Hanseatic City and the Metropolitan Region, as an especially valuable activity.

Asia / Overseas

HHR Mumbai

India is an important trading partner for the Port of Hamburg. Several times a week, container, general cargo, heavy-lift and RoRo services connect the Hanseatic City with India. Among the most transported goods are machinery and equipment, metals and metal products, chemical products and textiles and clothing. India's importance for Hamburg is even more apparent when Indian imports and exports routed as transit cargo via Sri Lanka and such Arab ports as Dubai are considered too.

The Hamburg Representative Office in Mumbai is the Free and Hanseatic City's official representation in India. This office was launched in January 2011 to expand relations between the two cities. Backing came from the Hamburg Senate Chancellery, Port of Hamburg Marketing, Hamburg Invest Business Development Agency, Hamburg Messe und Congress (HMC), and Hamburg Chamber of Commerce. The Representative Office cultivates contacts with Hamburg companies and organizations and to an equal extent with Indian partners interested in Hamburg. The local team benefits from the networks of the German-Indian Chamber of Commerce and its backers. Sameeha Pradeep Sule has headed the Representative Office in Mumbai since September 2022.

HHR Shanghai

Economic relations between China and Germany have deepened over recent decades. Foreign trade statistics indicate that in 2022, China was Germany's strongest trading partner for the seventh time running. Much of this cargo is transported via the Port of Hamburg as the central hub between land and sea transport. Although trade with

China is naturally subject to fluctuations, over the years the share of 'China cargo' in Hamburg has steadily remained at about one-third of total throughput. The People's Republic regularly heads the list of the Port of Hamburg's TOP Ten trading partners. On both the import and export sides, the categories most transported include chemical products, machinery and household appliances, wooden products and metals and metal products. Chinese companies particularly appreciate the Port of Hamburg for its excellent transport infrastructure with the European hinterland, especially in Central and Eastern Europe.

HHM's Representative Office in Shanghai covers the markets in Central and Northern China. Along with Shanghai as the world's largest container port, the area contains the ports of Tianjin, Qingdao, Dalian and Ningbo, among others, as well the hinterland with its inland ports along the river Yangtze as far as Chongqing. Hamburg and Shanghai have been sister cities twinning since



1986. At the same time, HLO - Hamburg Liaison Office China (HLO) was established as Hamburg's official representation in China, fronting the interests of the Hamburg Senate, the Hamburg Chamber of Commerce, Hamburg Invest Business Development Agency, Port of Hamburg Marketing, Hamburg Tourism and Hamburg Marketing.

HHR Hong Kong

The Representative Office in Hong Kong is specially committed to deepening trading relations between the conurbations of Hamburg and Hong Kong, the rest of the Pearl River delta and Southern China. In addition, Shenzhen in China has been linked with Hamburg for 16 years in a port partnership. The markets of S.E Asia are also covered by the representative activities of the Hong Kong office.

Market development by HHM Headquarters

Asian markets are of special importance for the Port of Hamburg's foreign trade and are therefore intensively covered by headquarters. Until autumn 2022, Mathias Schulz was responsible for this area, including coordination of the Representative Office in Shanghai, Hong Kong and Mumbai. He was supported by Inga Gurries, who took over as Head of Market Development Asia on 1 October. Online and face-to-face events, participation in trade fairs and locally adapted social media marketing are used to promote the locational advantages of the port of Hamburg and to cultivate contacts with overseas markets in Asia. Other overseas markets, such as North America, are covered by Port of Hamburg Marketing from its headquarters in Hamburg. In 2022, travel was still severely restricted by the corona pandemic. In November, however, it was possible to attend the transport logistic America trade fair in Florida. In covering overseas markets, HHM always tries to exploit synergies with Hamburg institutions and other ports.
